## Halleran paints picture of Masonic courtesy

Michael A. Halleran offered a new look at Freemasonry during the War Between the States and the many recorded courtesies exchanged between Brothers on both sides of the conflict. Bro. Halleran, the 2010 Anson Jones Lecturer, is author of the new book, *The Better Angels of our Nature - Freemasonry in the American Civil War*, published by The University of Alabama Press.


Following lunch, Bro. Halleran began a preliminary presentation before the more formal Power Point-enhanced lecture back in the lodge room.

Giving aid and comfort to enemy combatants who were Masons is part of the lore of the war. Bro. Halleran explored the major Masonic stories and found other, lesser known, but equally touching incidents. He debunked the particular myth

that Confederate General Lewis A. Armistead made the Masonic sign of distress as he lay mortally wounded during Pickett's charge at Gettysburg.

A total of 57 TLR members, wives and Masons, attended the lunch and others joined for the afternoon presentation. Following the lecture, the Worshipful Master presented Bro. Halleran with the apron of a Full Member of Texas Lodge of Research.

The Anson Jones weekend is always a high point in the TLR year, and this one was no exception.



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### *The Better Angels of Our Nature* *Freemasonry in the American Civil War*

- A review by Christopher Hodapp, author of *Freemasons for Dummies*

Michael Halleran is no stranger to Texas Masons. He writes the humorous "Brother Brother" stories for the *Scottish Rite Journal*, and is editor of *The Plumblin*, the quarterly newsletter of the Scottish Rite Research Society. His new book, *The Better Angels of Our Nature*, is an in-depth study of interactions between Freemasons during the American Civil War. This outstanding work explores the legends and long-told tall tales of the fraternity in an academic fashion, with both dispassionate analysis of the facts, and an obvious passion for the subject.

The personal accounts from both sides of the Civil War bring the experience to life for modern readers, instead of being able to hold it at a polite distance — perhaps because it was the first war that had, not just commanders, but so many enlisted men educated enough to write letters and diaries. **Continued on Page 3.**

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## Review

There is a formality and love of the language during this period that has left us a wealth of material to discover. Halleran has carefully examined the most common Masonic anecdotes from the Civil War, tracking down their sources and the real history behind them. This is not a sentimental book of apocrypha, but a well-researched work, published as much for Masons as it is for academics. In some cases, he tramples on some long-cherished fables the fraternity has endlessly repeated over the years, but in others he finds the humanity and truth behind the events. The result is a stirring affirmation of the bond between warring Masonic broth-

ers, in the conflict that brought more of them together on opposing sides of the battlefield than any in our history.

The book's poetic title comes from Abraham Lincoln's inaugural address on March 4, 1861, as he argued passionately before his audience and the nation to keep the Union together.

"We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained it must not break our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory, stretching from every battlefield and patriot grave to every living heart and hearthstone all over this broad land, will yet swell the chorus of the Union, when again touched, as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature."

## From the Secretary

In his latest Treasurer’s Report, Bro. Mark Dermit pointed out that a large percentage of our members have yet to pay their 2010 dues, which in the budget is our sole source of revenue. We have no return from Grand Lodge on our sizeable number of Endowed Members. It’s easy to overlook one’s dues payment, especially when one receives his card with the request for prompt payment. We are happy to report that we read membership applications for ten new members at the June meeting, and have

processed three more since that meeting. This comes on top of 29 new members we added in March from County Durham in the UK.

TLR’s budget is as lean as it can be. Thanks to less expensive printing costs for the annual *Transactions* and quarterly *Occasional Bulletin*, we have seen a dramatic drop in those expenses. However, we face increasing postage costs after the first of next year and continue to anticipate an upturn in the economy to allow all of our members to enjoy the disposable income to pay

their dues promptly.

We do not want to lose any member due to the economy. If paying TLR dues causes a hardship, drop us a note, or e-mail. We do not report a member who falls behind as “NPD” to Grand Lodge. Neither do we issue Demits. We simply drop inactive members who are in arrears for two years from the mailing list.

Finally, if you move, please let us know. *Occasional Bulletins*, which are returned, with or without an address correction, cost the lodge \$1.05 in Postage Due. *Transactions* that are undeliverable are “abandoned” by the post office and we not only lose the postage, but also the approximately \$8.00 each book costs to print.
