**Authors:** Please remember that when you submit a research paper, you must send one paper copy, plus a digital file on CD, DVD, or "thumb drive" to Brother Secretary at the lodge address listed elsewhere in this publication. It is recommended that papers be mailed with USPS delivery confirmation. He logs in the paper, retains the digital media and forwards the paper copy to the Senior Warden, who in turn distributes it to the Editorial Committee. - Thank you for your cooperation.

## Isn't it time to get started on that paper?

Of the almost 700 members of TLR, only about 90 are "Full Members." Full Members, with few exceptions, are those who have researched and successfully presented a research paper before the lodge. As set forth in TLR by-laws, only Full Members may vote or hold elective office in lodge.

So, why so relatively few Full Members?

Perhaps it's finding a topic, or just sitting down and putting thought to paper.

The first step is to read the *Form and Style Manual* which is posted on the TLR website. Print it out (it's about 25 pages) as not following the manual is the single biggest complaint from the Editorial Committee and delays a successful outcome.

TLR initiated a Mentoring Committee to help first-time authors get over any apprehension and answer questions about appropriate content and presentation. Chairman Herb Arbuckle (361) 816-2969 and his committee members are ready and willing to help. They are all published TLR authors and have been where you are now.

The distinctive TLR apron you see below is only part of the prestige of being a published Masonic author in our *Transactions*.
