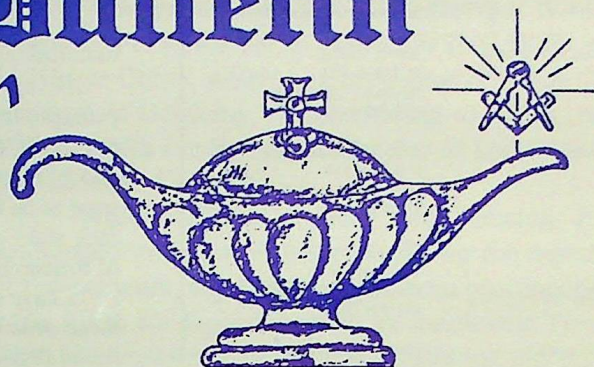

Curtis To Be Anson Jones Lecturer

Ill. Richard H. Curtis, 33^o, will present the 2000 Anson Jones Lecture during the June meeting in Austin. The annual lecture will be held in conjunction with an evening banquet at the Radisson Hotel on Town Lake in Austin. Reservations with the Austin Scottish Rite will be required for the banquet.

Brother Curtis is the current Editor of *The Northern Light*, the official publication of the Northern Jurisdiction of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. He has been associated with *The Northern Light* since 1969, serving as an Assistant Editor until 1975 when he was named Editor.

A resident of Reading, Massachusetts, Brother Curtis received an Associate of Arts Degree from Boston University and a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Nasson College. Over the years he has been active in civic organizations and the Episcopalian Church, serving as a Lay Assistant since 1968. Brother Curtis is married and the father of a son and daughter.

Brother Curtis' introduction to Masonry came through his activities in DeMolay. He served as Master Councilor of the Middlesex Chapter in Reading during 1956-57 and continued his activities with the DeMolay after becoming a Mason. His Masonic career began in 1961 when he became a Master Mason. He served as Master of Good Samaritan Lodge in Reading during 1973-74. He is a member of both the York Rite and Scottish Rite Bodies in Massachusetts. He is also a member of Aleppo Shrine Temple, Massachusetts Rosicrucians, and a Fellow of the Philalethes Society. In 1980, he received the 33^o Honorary from the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite.

I have suggested that an immediate starting point could be setting up interviews with each of the living Past Grand Masters and recording those interviews. None of us knows when we may be called to the Lodge Not Made With Hands, and I would hate to lose the views of our Past Grand Masters because of our inaction. Working together, I'm sure we can develop a history of our Grand Lodge that will bring great pride to our Grand Lodge and esteem to Texas Lodge of Research.

Texas Lodge of Research has grown by leaps and bounds since 1958 but we still are in need of new writers. I have assigned the new Junior Warden the job of being the head "Mentor" of the Lodge. If you have a topic you want to write about, that's great. If you don't, then contact Dr. Rogers and he can assist you in getting started. The "Mentors" won't write your paper for you, but they can certainly give you guidance that will help you earn that special apron that full members wear.

I look forward to seeing you at the Anson Jones Lecture in Austin. Many of you have voiced an opinion that you would like to move the Anson Jones Lecture out of Austin, but after having given consideration to a number of factors, we just couldn't pass up Brother Gordon Kelso's invitation to meet in Austin again this year. Brother Kelso and his staff have worked hard to make the meeting both affordable and entertaining. I know that all who attend will surely find that peculiar friendship and brotherly love that caused each of us to take upon ourselves those solemn obligations of our fraternity flowing abundantly. James R. Beeler Master, 2000-2001

The eldest child of George C. and Margaret S. Beeler was born on October 30, 1945 in East St. Louis, Illinois. Except for the intervention of Aluminum Company of America, Papa George's employer that transferred him to the Coastal Bend area of Texas, we might be dealing with a purebred "Yankee." Fortunately, Jim arrived in Texas at age fifteen, which was young enough to qualify him to be a legitimate Texan. The fact is, the Beeler family arrived in Port Lavaca on the heels of Hurricane Carla in September 1961, and rumor has it that neither the family or Port Lavaca have been the same since.

Jim graduated from Calhoun High School in 1963 and attended Victoria College and the University of Houston but that activity was interrupted in 1966 by an invitation from "Uncle Sam" to join the army and see the world. He was selected to attend Officers Candidate School, and completed Ordnance, OCS in Aberdeen, Maryland in September 1967, and was stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. In August 1969, he was assigned to the 27th Maintenance Battalion of the 1st Cavalry Division in Vietnam. A year later, he resumed his studies at the University of Houston where he received his BBA in Accounting and became associated with Trunkline Gas Company while attending law school at night. It was May 1976 when Jim graduated from South Texas College of Law in Houston with a Juris Doctorate

Degree and was admitted to the Texas Bar and the South Texas Division of the Federal Bar. From 1976 until 1994 Jim practiced law in the Houston area until he moved his practice to Victoria to be near his family.

At age 13, Jim became a member of Tancred Chapter, Order of DeMolay in Belleville, Illinois where he was a member of the Black Knights Drum and Bugle Corps, which was composed of some 125 members of DeMolay. Upon moving to Texas, Jim affiliated with Joe B. Moore Chapter of DeMolay in Port Lavaca. Ordnance

While stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Jim petitioned Port Lavaca Lodge No. 36 for the degrees of Freemasonry, and Brother Jack, who was engaged in his quest for higher learning at Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos, petitioned the same lodge at the same time. The brothers received their degrees and stood their proficiency examinations together. In October 1983 Jim received the degrees of the York Rite and Scottish Rite and was admitted into the Shrine. A Charter Member of the William Taylor Chapter, Philalethes Society, he served as president of the Chapter in 1992. His other Masonic accomplishments include Worshipful Master of L.M. Rodgers Lodge No. 1104 in Austwell, Texas; Thrice Illustrious Master of Port Lavaca Council No. 275, Royal and Select Masters; High Priest of Port Lavaca Chapter, Royal Arch Masons; and, Commander of Saint Johns Commandery No. 101 at Victoria.

Additional Masonic recognition for Jim has been his service as District Deputy Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Texas in 1999; membership in the South Texas York Rite College No. 169; the South Texas Conclave, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine; and, the John L. Harris Chapter No. 397, National Sojourners and Heroes of 76.

Jim considers his highest achievement to be that of winning the hand of his lovely and supportive wife Brenda, and having reared five sons to manhood. One of those sons, Scott, has continued the Beeler family Masonic tradition by receiving the degrees of Masonry in L.M. Rodgers Lodge No. 1104.

Such has been the life of Brother James R. Beeler. Based upon his character as a man and a Mason, the members of Texas Lodge of Research can go to the East with a great deal of anticipation that he will guide our Lodge to more noble deeds and greater achievements.

THE VICTORIA MEETING

As I drive across Texas to attend meetings of Texas Lodge of Research, I like to think of other places I have been that look something like the countryside I am passing through. On the five-hour drive to Victoria, on Friday the 17th, I thought about the comparison with the places I have traveled in England. The trip from Tyler to Rockdale made me think of the hills in Wiltshire where my wife's sister lives. The big difference is that those hills over there are much greener than the ones I was traveling through. And of course we don't have any castles, or Gothic cathedrals, or ancient stone circles, or white horses carved in the side of green hills, or.... Well, maybe they really don't compare too well after all. Two lane highways do compare. They are twisty and when you are stuck behind a slow moving vehicle the only good place to pass has several cars coming from the opposite direction. At least we have shoulders, paved shoulders, on our roads and sometimes the slow driver will pull over and let you pass. I remember once going back into a castle where Kevin Costner filmed a movie. The last five miles were on a one-lane road and when you met a car coming from the other direction, one of you had to back up to a wide spot to let the other pass. Now I have been on some primitive county roads in East Texas, but none that I had to back up on to let someone going the other way get by. OK, so this doesn't have anything to do with Masonry, but it will show you what some of us go through to attend our meetings.

Friday evening the faithful gathered at the hotel and then went out to eat. Someone once said "La Quinta" translates to "Right next door to Denny's." I have traveled around the state with Worshipful Master Clyde Kenneaster enough to know that he is very choosy about where he will eat and Denny's is not on his list. We tried another well-known chain, but the line was long and we were told it would be a 45-minute wait before we would be seated. We found a place with a buffet where they would push several tables together and we had a nice dinner with lots of fellowship. When we returned to the La Quinta we went to the hospitality room and spent an hour or so solving all the problems of Masonry before we headed

for our own rooms and a good night's sleep.

When I arrived at Victoria Lodge No. 40 at 8:30 the next morning, I slipped in the back door and found the kitchen crew starting the dinner we would share at noon. Little by little others began to arrive and soon we left for a little field trip to downtown Victoria where we visited the Fort St. Louis Archeological Project of the Texas Historical Commission. Fort St. Louis was the headquarters set up by the French explorer La Salle in 1685. Many of the artifacts dug up at the sight, which is on private land, are brought to the location in Victoria for cleaning and cataloguing. You will also find a couple of pictures I took while we were there. If you are not on the Internet you will just have to visit Victoria and see for yourself.

When we returned to the Lodge, the ladies, with credit cards in hand, left for a shopping spree as we opened Texas Lodge of Research and got down to business. Worshipful Master Clyde Kenneaster opened Texas Lodge of Research in due form at 10:34 a.m. with 39 officers and members in attendance. Introductions revealed there were 9 Past Masters of the Lodge (two of them Past Grand Masters), two Fellows of the Lodge, the Grand Photographer, a past Grand Master of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons and a Past Grand Commander of Knights Templar present.

In the absence of Secretary Plez Transou, Past Master and Fellow, the minutes of the previous meeting was read by Past Master Chuck Bukin. The Necrology report of Chaplain Ray Kirkpatrick revealed we lost 19 members to death. Twenty-three petitions for affiliation were received and the petitioners were accepted into the Lodge.

Jack Beeler, Past Master and Book Sales Chairman, reported we sold around \$13,000.00 in books last year. So far this year we have sold over \$1,000.00 in books at Grand Master's Conferences. A lengthy discussion ensued on books that are not selling, books that we should be selling, and books we should take off our inventory. It was suggested we have some of our members review books and have the reviews available at our sales table. It was pointed out that many Masonic book reviews are available on Bro.

Paul Bessel's web page that could prove helpful to potential buyers. For those on the Internet, the reviews can be found at <http://bessel.org/bkrevs.htm>. Brother Bessel has many pages of facts and lists of interesting information on Masonry. He is the Director of the Masonic Leadership Course, located in the George Washington Masonic National Memorial in Alexandria, Virginia, and Junior Grand Steward of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia.

Brother William P. "Bill" Vaughn, Editor of our Transactions, reported Volume XXXIII is nearing completion. Although there were some good papers for the volume, there were none that qualified for either the Ziller or Carter awards. Brother Vaughn stated we have some very talented non-professional writers and the quality of the papers over the past ten years have been good. He gave part of the credit for this to the screening done by the Editorial Committee.

The report of the By-Laws Committee, by Past Master Pete Martinez, indicated the Committee is waiting for the report of the Committee on Officers' Duties. R: W: Leonard P. Harvey, Past Grand Master and Past Master, reported that his committee was not finished with their task.

After a discussion on revising our "Criteria and Style Sheet and Writing Guidelines for Papers Submitted to Texas Lodge of Research" the feelings of the majority was summed up by Junior Warden Ross J. Cox, Sr., with the time honored statement: "If it ain't broke, don't fix it!" Past Masters Vaughn, Normand, and Wiggins reinforced this sentiment. Senior Warden, James Beeler, complimented the Editorial Committee for their work on the papers that were reviewed by them during the year. I responded for the committee that it had been our pleasure to be of service to the Lodge.

Claims and Accounts of \$3,725.83 were read by Secretary Pro-tem Charles Bukin and approved by the Lodge. Treasurer James F. Brumit, Jr. reported on our financial condition and suggested we need to write-off the value of some of our old Transactions from our inventory. This will reduce our assets and the value of inventory. This will be checked into.

Worshipful Master Clyde Kenneaster called on Past Master Leonard P. Harvey to take the East and conduct the election of officers. The new officers are listed on page 2 of the Occasional Bulletin and in the

designated location on the On-Line Occasional Bulletin on the Internet. The address of our web page is <http://pentium2.gower.net/Community/tlr>.

The Lodge was then called from Labor to Refreshment and after a fine lunch prepared by some of the members of Victoria Lodge No. 40, the open session of Texas Lodge of Research began. This session was opened with prayer and pledges to the United States and Texas flags.

Senior Warden James R. Beeler then took charge of the meeting and introduced first time presenter James C. Yelvington, III, whose paper, "The Masonic Origins of Lon Morris College," was read by the author. Lon Morris College is one of the few schools started by Masons in the mid-1800s that is still in existence and flourishing.

After the presentation of the paper, Past Master Leonard P. Harvey, PGM, took the East as Installing Officer with the assistance the Installing Marshal, Past Master John E. "Jack" Kelly, PGM, the installation of officers took place. With these two distinguished Brethren doing the honors, it makes the serious business of installation of officers a lot of fun.

When the Ladies and Non-Masons were excused, the new Worshipful Master, James R. Beeler, called the Lodge from Refreshment to Labor and the first order of business was to invite Brother James C. Yelvington, III, to Full Membership in Texas Lodge of Research. His friend, and our Junior Deacon, Gordon Kelso tied his new G. L. R. T. Apron on him. Texas Lodge of Research was then closed in proper form.

And wouldn't you know, I got stuck behind two pickups towing fifth wheel travel trailers for 20 miles on a two lane US highway with a speed limit of 65 mph and they never got over 50 mph.

The Austin Meeting June 16-17, 2000

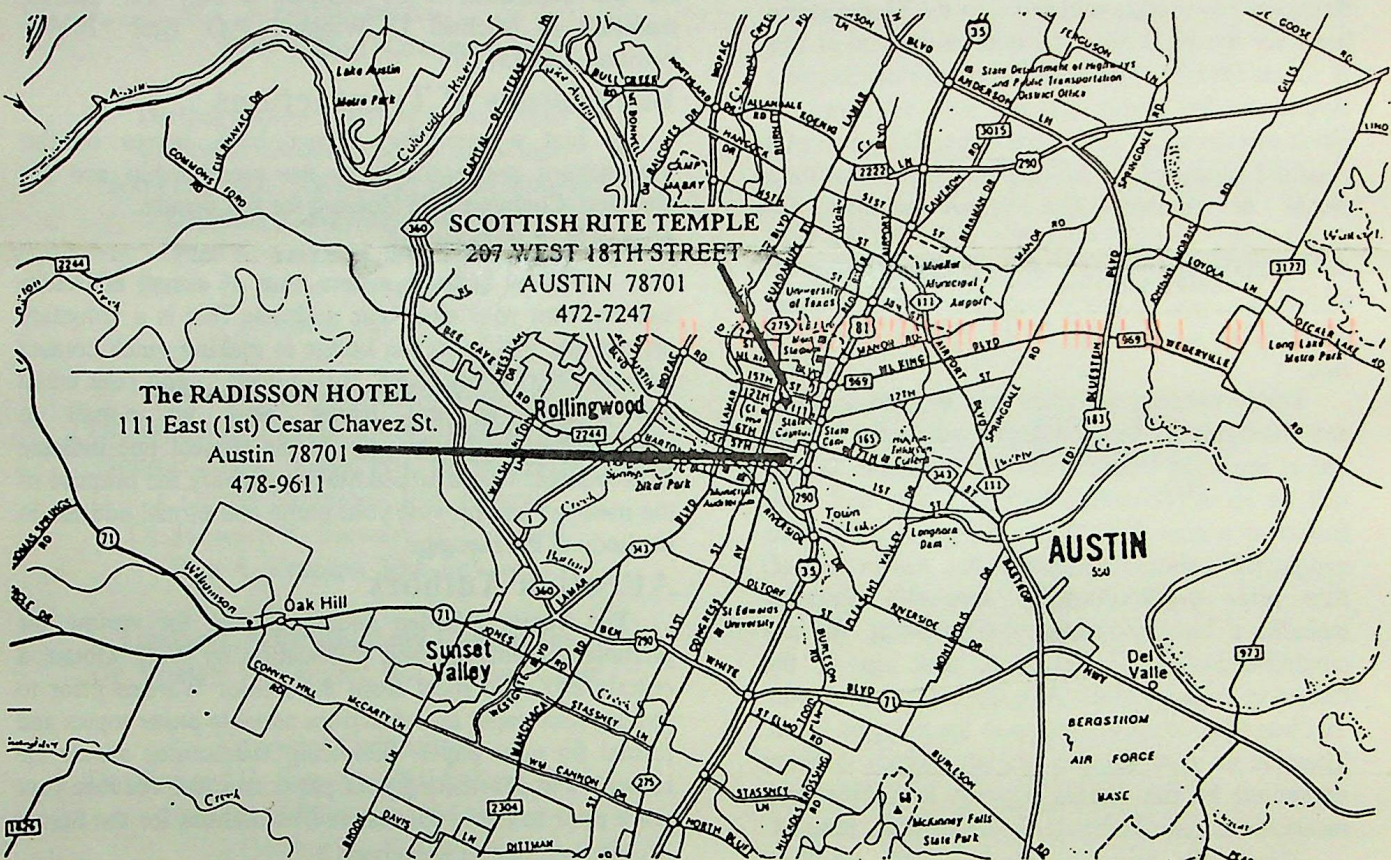
